Montgomery County Community College HIS 215 American Immigration 3-3-0

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will examine the immigrant experience in the United States in a loose chronological manner by focusing on diversity issues, analyzing legislation and highlighting anti-immigrant social movements. The students will research the personal aspect of immigration by studying the lives of immigrants in autobiographical accounts and historical fiction. Class discussions will focus on discovering to what extent America is a society of immigrants.

At the conclusion of each semester/session, assessment of the learning outcomes will be completed by course faculty using the listed evaluation method(s). Aggregated results will be submitted to the Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs. The benchmark for each learning outcome is that 70% of students will meet or exceed outcome criteria.

SEQUENCE OF TOPICS:

- 1. <u>The Dynamics of Emigration from the Countries of Origin</u> Where did the immigrants come from and why? The reasons for emigration, the "push" factors, will be examined. We will look at wars, famines, political oppression, religious persecution, economic disasters, and racism.
- 2. <u>The Mode of Travel</u> How did the emigrants get to the ports of departure, and from there how did they travel across the ocean? How did they finance these trips? What were the dangers?
- 3. <u>First Experiences in the New Land</u> What did they find upon arrival? How were immigrants received? Where and how did they live at first? Is racism in America a product of immigration?
- 4. <u>The Process of Acculturation</u>

How did the immigrants cope with problems like learning a new language, a new way of dressing and acting, a new way of thinking about themselves and society? In what ways did they cling to the culture they brought with them? How did the second and third generations differ from the original immigrants?

5. <u>The Ethnic Heritage and Its Place in America Today</u> How much of the "American" Culture is a blend of distinct ethnic items? Is the "Ethnic Factor" in America being exploited in consumer advertising? In Political campaigning? Has America ever really been a "melting pot"?
